Human Rights Town - the App!



The Scottish Commission for People with Learning **Disabilities** (SCLD) has launched a new app, 'Human Rights Town' designed to empower people with learning disabilities to recognise and realise their human rights.

The development of the app has been led by a group of people with learning disabilities who have been working with SCLD and digital design company, Publishing Bureau, to create the finished product.

The app invites users to travel around a virtual 'Human Rights Town' where they encounter different scenarios at each location, such as using public transport or working at the supermarket. Through practical

examples 'Human Rights Town' introduces users to each of their human rights, under the United Nations **Convention on the Rights** of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) and asks them to choose whether they believe their rights are being respected or not in each scenario. Users have the option of further explanation at each location. Each scenario has been voiced over by a person with a learning disability who has helped to develop the app.

The Human Rights Town app is available to download for free from Apple App Store and Google Play Store.

THE POWER OF PLAY

For the first of our August Inservice days, we were delighted to welcome renowned speaker and play specialist, Ben Kingston-Hughes of Inspired Children. School session 2021-2022 started after 18 months of isolation, bubbles and global existential angst. We needed some exceptional, experiential, face-to-face professional development to prepare us for the new academic year, and to make sure we can engage with all of our children on their return. So we invited Ben along to help us understand why play is so important for learning and development.

The key messages were that children need to play, in different ways and with elements of risk, to develop healthy brains and essential skills, and that as practitioners, we need to be on the lookout for play cues and the signs of play deprivation.

With a combination of theoretical background and practical activity, the day gave us lots of new ideas and knowledge, and a safe environment for getting to know our teams better. It also highlighted some costeffective, flexible resources which would be a great addition for outdoor play. All staff clearly enjoyed this development day and although we are already on our way to using play more widely, this demonstrated the link between theory and practice in a very practical way. To ensure that we maximise the impact of our learning, we will arrange practice-sharing sessions later in the term.

A Reflection on Our Care Inspection

Introduction

In January 2019, Karen Ferguson, our Care Services manager and I attended a Care Inspectorate Conference to explore their new methodology.We were informed at this stage that they would be implementing a new framework using the new Health and Social Care Standards to frame 5 key questions:

How well do we support people's wellbeing?, How good is our leadership?, How good is our staff team?, How good is our setting? And How well is our care and support planned?, plus a final key question What is our overall capacity for improvement?.

This would still be measured using their six point scale ranging from Unsatisfactory (1) to Excellent (6).

Intensive Support Services Inspection

Skye and Lewis inspection had been delayed due to the pandemic, however Philip Yeaman and Beverley Gifford arrived at East Park for an unannounced Inspection on the 28th of June 2021. They introduced themselves to the staff and young people on site and requested the information they would require over the next week while their inspection took place.

What the Inspection consisted of

Philip and Beverley wanted to look at all the paperwork relevant to the young people and their care, to interview new and experienced staff, to speak to parents and to participate in activities with the young people that allowed them to observe communication, practice and engagement.

How the process felt

Our young people were not inconvenienced by the process in any way. Philip and Beverley asked to see the activity plans for our young people and requested to participate in those which would be most appropriate for the young people involved. They spent time over the week getting to know them by reading their plans, observing with them and engaging with them. It was obvious to our young people that both Philip and Beverley genuinely cared about them and were interested in their lives. This made the activities easy to facilitate as positive relationships had already been developed.

Some of the support workers who were interviewed were nervous at first but felt the informal and relaxed questioning style of Philip and Beverley put them at ease quite quickly. They felt the process was supportive and that they had the knowledge and understanding of the service and young people to answer the questions they were asked. The biggest compliment I could give the Inspectors is that throughout the week, everything carried on as usual, the atmosphere remained the same in the service and their presence was positively received by all who engaged with them.

Informal feedback from the Inspectors about the service

- Young people have clear outcomes and Support Plans, Positive Behaviour Support Plans and Activity Plans are all individualised and meeting the young people's needs
- The progress that the young people have made in their Journeys at East Park have been heart-warming to read
- The work done to support transitions including transitions from the service have been excellent
- The assessment of risk for people as complex as some of the young people does not prevent them from living a full life and accessing the community
- It was clear from observing and speaking to the staff that the young people were loved, nurtured and well cared for
- The staff team appeared enthusiastic and really knew and understood the needs of the young people

- Staff appeared confident that they could make a difference and shape the support that the service offered
- The atmosphere in both services was warm and welcoming
- Family members feedback that they were extremely happy with the service their young people received and believed East park was the best place for them

A Manager's Reflection on The Inspection

I am so proud of each of the support workers and deputy team leaders that have made such a positive difference to the lives of our young people and their families during unprecedented times. The restrictions that would have been unimaginable at the last inspection has made the informal feedback all the more remarkable and highlights the creativity and innovation of our staff teams. I was delighted that they had made such a positive impression on Philip and Beverley and it reflects so well on the work they do that can often be taken for granted.

Grading and Final Report
